I've been exposed to many volunteering opportunities. When I was younger, I was blessed with being able to participate for many years in such programs and activities like Vacation Bible School at Our Lady of the Rosary and fun programs at the Mt. Healthy branch of the public library. I was thankful for the people who volunteered and gave their time to provide safe and fun activities for me, and I thought it was important to give back and help the kids have as much fun as I did. So when I was old enough, I decided to volunteer in those same programs to give those opportunities to other young kids. When I turned a teen and was allowed to sign up, I applied to be a volunteer at the same Mt. Healthy branch where I participated in summer programs. I spent my last summer helping my local librarian with her kid programs. At OLR's VBS I was a youth leader for two years after I had enjoyed the great activities they provided to me when I attended as a young participant.
